





A resolution noting grave concerns for the Humanities urges the Australian Government to establish a National Advisory Council of the Humanities. A Ministerial response gives assurance the Association's fears are unfounded and it is unlikely the Government will establish a specialist body as proposed.

Women and Philosophy The Green Paper: a challenge to Philosophy Presidential Address to the Australasian Association of Philosophy, on the occasion of its Annual Conference, Perth. Sunday 15th May 1988 Press Release: Humanities Under Threat The Australasian Association of Philosophy, the professional association of Australia's academic philosophers, held its annual meeting in Perth this week. After extensive discussions on the Green Paper on Higher Education, the following motion was passed at the Annual General Meeting with overwhelming The Australasian Association of Philosophy views with grave concern many of the proposals of the Green Paper on Higher Education. It considers the implementation of the proposals, whether directly by legislation or indirectly by Government agencies, would be likely to have serious detrimental effects on teaching and research in Philosophy and in the Humanities in General. The Association urges the Government to establish a National Advisory Council of the Humanities, consisting of representatives of each major discipline, to advise the Government on the likely effects of new educational policies which concern teaching or research in the Humanities and to monitor the implementation of such policies. The Association would wish to nominate a philosopher to serve on such a council.


