In our Centenary year, the tertiary landscape is much changed.

The discipline has professionalised, as has the Association. There are now philosophy programs in thirty-four universities, across Australia, New Zealand and Singapore with over four hundred teaching and research staff, compared to ten Australasian universities with less than twenty staff in 1923.

Our Centenary conference features more than two hundred papers with twelve concurrent sessions - a far cry from six papers presented at the first Australasian Philosophical Congress in 1924.



Australasian Journal of Philosophy, the first journal of its kind in Australasia, is world leading and internationally recognised. Australasian Philosophical Review, now in its sixth year, will soon be joined by Philosophical Exchange – a fully open access publication.

Yet some things remain the same.


